Budget and Precept

The meeting on 31st January included setting the budget to request the Precept from SCDC, This money comes out of council tax so the PC tries to keep it as low as possible, especially as we know that District and County Councils will need to increase their portion of the tax. Due to increased demand on County Councils services, all Parish Councils are having to undertake more local maintenance work. We have had to make provision for an increased number of grass cuts, cycle path lighting maintenance, tree works, maintenance of assets, such as the toilet block and 'bus shelters, the new data protection regulations, the elections in May and requests for grants from local groups, resulting in an increase in the Precept. The budget will be published with the minutes of the meeting on the PC website at HPC website. County and District Councillor reports will be included.

Parking on High Street

The PC has received complaints about cars parked on the pavement in parts of the High Street. This makes wheelchair and buggy access difficult and damages the

pavement. It also tempts drivers to try to squeeze past rather than passing when the road is clear, causing hazards to oncoming traffic and the parked cars. Residents and their visitors are asked not to park on the pavement and where possible use off-road parking.

Residents are very welcome at PC meetings; the next ordinary meeting is on Wednesday 28th March at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Waterbeach Barracks Development: RLW meeting report *Margaret Starkie*

Thirty people attended the Horningsea meeting held by RLW on 10th January. The eastern part of the site of the new town at Waterbeach will be developed by a Cambridge company, Turnstones, in association with Royal London representing St. John's College and landowners trust. The original SCDC Local Plan included eight to nine thousand dwelling and related infrastructure. Urban & Civic has submitted an Outline Planning Application for up to 6,500 dwellings and RLW will submit an OPA for 4.500. Representatives of RLW told the meeting that, though this would increase the original allocation, they want to have sufficient infrastructure to meet the demand for housing in this area. As well as RLW's presentation we had a summary from County Cllr. Anna Bradnam of the recently reported A10 Ely to Cambridge Transport Study, which makes special mention of mitigating rat-running on the B1047. District Cllr. Robert Turner and Planning Officer Mike Huntington updated us on the planning process and the LP examination. There was a lively discussion and many questions from residents, mostly about the effect of increased vehicular traffic, modal shift to public transport, cycleway provision, new rail station location, density and building height, use of alternative forms of energy (solar panels but not likely to be wind turbines), high grade insulation, water recovery and waste water management. SCDC is preparing a Supplementary Planning Document which expands on the policies in the LP, considers the spacial framework in relation to the primary network of roads and cycleways and manages the delivery of the LP across the whole site with provision of schools, health centre, faith centre and library and decides which landowner will be responsible for such costs.

RLW is working with Network Rail to produce an OPA for the new rail station in about three months; it will be located to the north east of the new town with access to parking specifically for those travelling from the south and separate parking area for those from the north. We were told that the current station must be replaced as even currently the level crossing is dangerous due to numbers of pedestrian access.

Policing in Cambridgeshire

Horningsea Parish Council

Following the recent Local Policing Review and on-line public consultation, the future policing model for Cambridgeshire has now been agreed to roll out from 30 April. The structure will enable Cambs. Police to fund an additional 50 officers:

- Residents will be able to access their local policing team with an identified PCSO in their area. However, there will be no new intakes of PCSOs and the current headcount will reduce by natural turnover to retain a minimum of 80 full time equivalent posts. PCSOs will continue to play a central role in neighbourhood policing and problem solving. Additional officers will be in areas of most vulnerable people and most dangerous offenders, focusing on issues such as child protection, rape investigation and domestic abuse.
- A Demand Hub will be created to merge the force's contact and crime management functions centrally at force HQ to modernise the approach to public contact and allow for early and more effective management of demand.
- The previous force model saw it split into six district areas; Horningsea was in the Sawston Neighbourhood area. This will change to two areas, north and south for more efficiency, reducing supervisory and senior management posts and to commit more resources to the frontline.
- A Missing, Exploited and Trafficked (MET) Hub will be created, tasked with protecting children most at risk of harm within these areas and focused on apprehending the offenders who target them.
- Changes to the current intelligence structure will increase analytical provision, allowing improved analysis of demand.
- Community action teams, similar to the current Rural Crime Action Team (RCAT), will be created to respond to local problems and challenges. These officers will be tasked with dealing with local issues, prioritising those where the risk to individuals and the public is highest.
- Every district council area will have an enquiry office function.
- A reduced number of response bases will allow for maximum efficiency in response deployment.
- The force will continue to have a serious and organised crime team, cyber and fraud team, and surveillance team to tackle crime gangs.

Notes

May 2018 elections - consider nomination to Horningsea Parish Council

Election to the Parish Council will be held on 3rd May. A notice will be published on 26th March asking for nominations to be received at SCDC by 6th April.

The Parish Council is comprised of seven members who must be over the age of 18yrs, be a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any member state of the European Union, have lived or worked within the parish area (or within three miles of it) for 12 months prior to nomination and be a registered local government elector.

The work of the PC is important, interesting but not onerous. The PC has ordinary meetings six times a year but may meet for extraordinary meetings if there are time restraints on decisions, such as planning applications. Members decide on a budget each January to pay for council business; this includes grass cutting, cemetery and other maintenance, employee salary, insurance and grants to local groups. This budget determines the Precept from the District Council which is gathered from council taxes - your money!

The PC considers planning applications ranging from small extensions to the large New Town at Waterbeach. It liaises with District and County Councils, Police, Health Services and local groups. It listens to local issues and residents are always welcome at meetings.

CAMBRIDGE SEA CADETS WELCOMES YOUNG PEOPLE

Cambridge Sea Cadets is calling for young people to come on board this February to see how being a cadet can make a difference to their lives.

The unit, which meets at TS Ganges, Cheddars Lane, near Tesco on Newmarket Road, is welcoming new cadets as part of Sea Cadets' national campaign, #NeverOrdinary, which runs throughout the month and aims to raise awareness of what the charity can offer.

Horningsea Adults & Toddlers - HATs

Horningsea adult and toddler group meets on a Tuesday morning in the village hall in Horningsea from 10-11:30.

We have Play-doh, a toy kitchen and food, toy farm animals, cars and garages, Duplo, puzzles, books and drawing materials as well as baby friendly toys along with support cushions for the really tiny ones. If the weather is nice the children have the opportunity to play outside with outdoor toys.

For adults there is a hot drink and biscuit and a chance for a chat whilst the little ones play.

A snack and drink is given to the children half way through the session which is included in the cost of the attendance. This cost is £2 per session, per family. However, if you pay for four sessions at once it's £6 (£1.50 per session).

Adults without children are also welcome if you fancy a hot drink and a chat (amongst the noise of the children playing), a £1 donation is asked for in this instance.

Bell Ringers at the church

Bellringing practice in Horningsea is on the second and last Friday of each month from 19:00 to 20.30. Do come along and find out about learning how to ring. There is no age limit! You don't need to be musical and many Bell Ringers are not members of a church congregation. We have just managed to open our box of handbells and on some Fridays there will be a chance to try handbell ringing as well.

Reporting non-emergencies online

Non-emergency situations can now be reported to the police online if people would rather do so than call 101.

In October last year Cambridgeshire Constabulary re-launched their website with added functionality to report non-emergencies via specially designed forms or a live webchat.

The live webchat option enables people to communicate directly with a member of staff in the control room, just as would be the case when calling 101. Online forms are processed in the same way as a call and the person reporting can expect a response within 24 hours.

Due to the high level of demand there are often queues when calling 101. Reporting online is quick, easy and free of charge.
