Horningsea Residents Association Chairman's Report 2016

It was with considerable trepidation that I took over the role of Chairman from John Wilson in January 2016. He had filled the post for eighteen years and was going to be a hard act to follow. Under his chairmanship the Association has evolved a full calendar of regular events plus the expectation of the odd 'extraordinary' function. This year, being that of the Queen's ninetieth birthday, was promising to be one of those.

The first event of the year was the Seniors Lunch on March 23rd. I was pleased to be invited to dine with the seniors, but also horrified to learn that I was a senior too! The event was fully attended. Several of the committee helped to prepare an excellent meal under the leadership of Jenni Hill.

On April 15th we had our regular Bingo Night with a fish and chip supper. This event produces groans from those pretending not to enjoy it, but it fills up well every year!

June 11th was Village Day combined with celebrations for the Queen's ninetieth birthday. We are grateful to the Parish Council for the special grant which allowed us to hire a ceilidh band, plus HRA funds were used to purchase a marquee which will be useful for many years to come.

July 16th saw the Village Disco and Barbeque which was another highly convivial event with much delicious food and the event sprawled on into a warm summer night.

In Autumn, the already-busy Horningsea life goes into overdrive. It was a perfect late-summer afternoon when five boats left St John's Lane flying the official Horningsea flag for the village boat trip and laden with about fifty villagers. Drinkers in the Bridge at Clayhithe sat open-mouthed as the flotilla steamed gently past towards Bottisham Lock, where we made an unplanned stop and had an impromptu picnic. Children played on the hayricks and dogs (and even some people) swam, with others dozing in the sun.

Two weeks later it was Apple Pressing Day and more brilliant weather. The production line is pretty slick these days. We must have picked at least a tonne of apples and trailered them to the Green for chopping, scratting, pressing and bottling.

Three weeks later and it's International Night. This year we chose Italian as our theme. The tables groaned with every kind of Italian food and we all knocked back the Chianti. Yet again the hall was packed to capacity.

This year's bonfire was another whopper, partly because of some long-overdue thinning of the Millennium Wood. The fireworks, hot dogs and soup were as brilliant as ever and the fire was lit by another of John Harrison's guided missiles. This is the major fund-raising event as it attracts people from miles around. This year was a record-breaker (again), allowing us to make a sizeable donation to charity.

On December 4th we had our usual Christmas tree lighting in the Jubilee Gardens. It's a short event, which is good because it was very cold, but we were all sustained by mulled wine and mince pies, courtesy of Pauline.

It's tempting to think that the HRA is all about having fun. There's nothing wrong with that, but there have been some other more serious matters to deal with this year. We manage the playground for the parish council, and a RoSPA report in April highlighted some areas of concern on the ageing equipment. The HRA has expended a £1500 budget on essential repairs to address these issues, but a small subcommittee under the leadership of Graham Haynes is in the process of submitting a bid to win funds to totally renew the equipment.

I am grateful to all of the HRA committee for the hard work that they have put in to make this year the success that it was, but particularly to Graham for his energetic input as Vice-Chair, which has been a great help to me personally in my inaugural year as Chairman.

We look forward to another successful year in 2017 in this varied and social village.

Waterbeach Development - presentation 30th November

Parish Council

Rebecca Britton of Urban & Civc attended the PC meeting on 30th November to present on the proposed development at the former Waterbeach Barracks. Residents raised some very important points; the PC noted these concerns and wants to talk more to Urban & Civic. These included:

- Horningsea could be used as a rat run as soon as houses are built and especially if any are occupied before the A10 is dualled
- Sufficient and frequent alternative means of travel must be available from the start; most people rely on cars and a modal change takes some time to achieve
- More information is needed on the location of the second station and the frequency of trains
- A cycle path on the east side of the river is needed; there is currently no safe cycle or pedestrian path on the east side of B1047
- Speed restriction on the B1047 travelling north is needed; the long, straight road from the A14 junction does not encourage drivers to reduce speed on entering the village
- Disruption to the village by construction traffic
- An undertaking that 40% affordable housing will be available. We understand
 that some of this might be Exception site so would primarily be available to local
 residents, their close relatives or those who work in the area. This would be
 welcome.

Later in the meeting we discussed the development and how we could communicate the process to our residents. We have to accept that it will happen but recognise that

we should turn it to our advantage and therefore need to make Horningsea's needs known to Urban & Civic right from the start.

To this end we will organise more meetings and invite residents to put forward their ideas. We will invest in a communications programme to ensure all are kept informed and know how to make their voices heard. The meetings will be in addition to ordinary council meetings and will be clearly advertised.

However, the development needs to be viewed in the context of the wider plans for Cambridge especially Greater Cambridge City Deal and Devolution, both of which are looking at transport infrastructure. There is more information here on the City Deal

Flood risk and riparian responsibility

The Parish Council has received an update from Cambs. County Council on Flood and Water Management. They ask us to alert owners of land adjoining, above or with watercourses running through their land, to be aware of their riparian responsibilities. The Environment Agency leaflet <u>Living on the Edge</u> is a guide to rights and responsibilities of riverside ownership.
