Remembrance Day Service in Horningsea

Sunday 12th November, 10.15 in Church, 10.50 at War Memorial

On Sunday 12th November the Remembrance Day Service will start at St Peter's Church at 10.15. At 10.45 the poppy wreaths will be collected by various Village groups – the HRA, Parish Council, Church Council, Friends of Horningsea Church and the veterans. The wreaths will be taken to the Jubilee Gardens where we will all gather for the concluding part of the service. John Wilson will read the names of the fallen of the Village and tell us a bit about each one – what they did before they went off to war, how old they were and where they are buried. We hope to have a trumpeter again to sound the Last Post as we keep the minute silence at 11:00. Everyone is invited to place a British Legion cross around the base of the Memorial.

99 years after the Armistice it is important we continue to remember "those who grow not old as we that are left grow old...". The Commonwealth War Graves Commission plan to put a notice in the Church Noticeboard in the next few months drawing attention to the fact that we have a war grave in Horningsea Churchyard. John Wilson will tell us the story of Captain Baker and how he came to be buried here.

After the Service everyone is invited back to the Church to warm up(!) over a hot coffee.

Reports

A Special Summer

After the spring's events (notably the ever-popular Bingo and Fish and Chips Night) we moved into summer with a special event on May 21st organised by Lindsay - the Coprolite March. To celebrate the anniversary of the coprolite worker's march in Victorian times, we met in the Jubilee gardens and set off for Quay Fen. The weather was perfect late spring combination of sunshine and cotton-wool clouds. As is usual in Horningsea, the happy band was swollen by a fair contingent of children and dogs.

For those who have not been to the Fen (can there really be any?) it is a beautiful area of unspoilt pasture and woodland with small lakes that were once the site of coprolite diggings. Coprolite was used as fertiliser and was a very busy industry in this village. It was responsible for Horningsea's highest population spike ever (more than 450) in the nineteenth century. We paused by the lake for the dogs to have a dip, and then pressed on to the shade of the lovely large oak tree for our picnic, close to the memorial to William Ison who was struck by



lightning on the Fen, allegedly whilst sheltering under a bale of straw held above his head with an iron pitchfork - wrong!

Village Day was on July 1st, and in the light of last year's popular ceilidh we decided to again ask The Stomp Happy Tribe to join us. Ceilidhs have the advantage of being fun for all ages, and this event was very well attended. The new marquee was erected with commendable effort from the team and it's presence ensured good weather. The event stretched long into a delightful summer evening.

The Village Boat Trip on 10th September was again an expanded event. We stopped at the GOBA moorings upstream of Bottisham Lock for a picnic. Unlike last year we were denied the pleasure of halcyon weather. It was grey and windy, but we all had fun - but nobody was tempted to swim.



The finely honed production process that is Apple Pressing Day took place on 30th September (the events come thick and fast at this time of year!) and the weather was perfect. The usual heap of apples was turned into the usual vessels of cloudy brown liquid, but it was a special pleasure to enjoy the company of a few guests from outside the village who joined in with the work.

October 14th was International Night - this year the cuisine was Thai - and a magnificent effort by the many superb cooks in the village contributed to a well-attended and riotously enjoyable evening.

So what makes this year particularly special? Well, for a village whose population has held more or less stable at 300 for the last 1000 years, apart from anomalies caused by coprolite (see above) and the Black Death, we have experienced something of our own little baby boom since April. Welcome to the world Benoît, Sebastian, Persephone and - most recently - Sid, and in particular welcome to your home - Horningsea.

Parish Council report

Paper caddy recycling by SCDC From 11th December residents will no longer need to use paper caddies; used paper should be placed directly into blue wheelie bins for recycling. Residents may keep their caddy following the change or take them to a household waste recycling centre. They should not be placed in wheelie bins. Illegal encampment guidance. Following a number of illegal Gypsy and Traveller encampments in the district, SCDC has issued some new guidance to parish councils to help them protect their land and deal with any issues that may arise. They have also

Low Fen Drove Way. As a result of crime, hare coursing, ASB and fly tipping there is a proposal to put a barrier at Horningsea Byway 17 & Fen Ditton Byway 14, the track at Lower Fen Drove which connects Snout's Corner to High Ditch Road. This would allow access to pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders but not to vehicles except emergency and farm vehicles with keys. The Parish Council discussed this at an EPC meeting on 25th October and agreed to support the proposal.

Sawston Police Panel meeting on 18th October highlighted issues with the 101 service and traveller encampments; Cambridge Constabulary is aware and addressing these.

Waterbeach Development EIAS The PC has considered the Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Request made on behalf of RLW for the site to the east of the former Waterbeach airfield and barracks. The proposed development includes 5,000 residential units, retail, leisure and business spaces, primary school, secondary school, sixth form centre and train station. This site is in addition to that for which Urban & Civic submitted an outline planning application in February for up to 6,500 dwellings, three primary schools, one secondary school and business and retail outlets as well as leisure facilities. The scope of the assessment is comprehensive but the PC has commented that it is premature given that the inspector has not reported on the Local Plan, that the total number of dwellings exceeds the LP proposal and it is difficult to assess without an Outline Planning Application.

S/0559/17/OL Application by Urban and Civic - the period for comments on this application has been extended to 31 December 2017. Responses from all the local PCs, Horningsea Planning Group, NHS, CCC Highways, Environment Department etc can be found on the SCDC planning portal at [WB responses](#)

Joint Parishes Meeting Representatives from Fen Ditton, Horningsea, Landbeach, Milton and Waterbeach met with officers and councillors from SCDC and CCC for an update on the Ely to Cambridge Transport Study (A10 corridor) and SCDC's Supplementary Planning Document for Waterbeach New Town. The Transport Study gathers data on rail, pedestrian, vehicular and cycling use to model future requirements. A report is expected early 2018 with wider consultation in March '18. The SPD will follow the proposals in the Local Plan and give the spatial framework for the primary road and cycle network, the schools provision and the town centre. With two landowners it must manage delivery across the whole site with infrastructure delivery on time. More information will be given at the PC meeting on Wednesday 29th November.

Consultation on Grafton Area Major Change - Cambridge City Council is running a consultation on this SPD from 25th September to 6th November. More information at [Grafton Masterplan](#)

The next PC meeting is in the village hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday 29th November. Members of the public are very welcome at PC meetings and may speak briefly during the Open Forum.

Venice - Vision and Voice - report

The interior of St Peter's Church was transported to Italy at the weekend with 'Venice - Vision and Voice', an exhibition combining a display of art by Janet Hathiramani, Frank Hopkirk and Ann Mitchell, three members of locally based Studio CB25, and a concert of Venetian music. There were images of the Grand Canal, churches, roof top skylines, bridges, gondolas, palazzos and islands of the lagoon in the form of paintings, drawings, prints and photographs, depicting not only the grand vistas but also the more intimate back street areas, away from the rush of the main thoroughfares.



To add to the event we were pleased to have the company of a lady mannequin suitably wearing a pair of knee-height Venetian plastic overshoes (yellow, to complement her purple dress) and a lovely silk scarf, both items purchased when the three artists visited the city last year on a drawing trip.

Visitors were invited to give her a name and the winner of a selection of cards will be drawn on Thursday. The rear pews of the church were adorned with the 6 barred comb seen on the gondola and there was a Venetian flag displayed on a pillar to remind anyone who still hadn't fully realised where they were!

There was a steady influx of people on both days but the main audience came on Saturday night to both view the art and to hear a concert of Venetian music performed by Fen Edge Voices and Fen Edge Baroque Ensemble. This included a sublime Renaissance choral canzona by Croce, Monteverdi's exuberant *Beatus vir* (Blessed is

the man who fears the Lord), a lovely and lively concerto for strings by Telemann and ended with Vivaldi's inspiring Gloria. As a counterpoint to the music we were intrigued by a talk given by gondolier Robin Rigby on the history and traditions of the gondola and gondoliers and on the techniques involved in controlling it by means of the oar on the *forcola*, requiring the highest degree of skill. Robin learnt his gondoliering in Venice, where he now rows as a club member, and has his own gondola which he and his wife have rowed in both London's Little Venice and Cambridge. The talk suitably ended with a rendition of two traditional gondolier songs with a back row chorus from the choir's men.

The Campanile Quartet played the weekend out on Sunday with music by Venetian composers arranged for the recorder.



All in all it was a great weekend, focussed on the single theme of an amazing city which holds a fascination for people the world over.

Horningsea Parish Charities

Horningsea Parish Charities were established over 200 years ago with a fund of money which is to be used to help provide for "those in need" in the parish. The four Trustees meet annually to consider if there are any people living in Horningsea who may be regarded as "being in need". Over the years small grants have been given to the elderly, to those who have had a particularly difficult financial year through redundancy or illness, grants have been given to enable children to go on the annual school residential week and for young people to go on a football tour. Horningsea Adults & Toddlers - HATs

Horningsea adult and toddler group meets on a Tuesday morning in the village hall in Horningsea from 10-11:30.

We have Play-doh, a toy kitchen and food, toy farm animals, cars and garages, Duplo, puzzles, books and drawing materials as well as baby friendly toys along with support cushions for the really tiny ones. If the weather is nice the children have the opportunity to play outside with outdoor toys.

For adults there is a hot drink and biscuit and a chance for a chat whilst the little ones play.

A snack and drink is given to the children half way through the session which is included in the cost of the attendance. This cost is £2 per session, per family. However, if you pay for four sessions at once it's £6 (£1.50 per session).

Adults without children are also welcome if you fancy a hot drink and a chat (amongst the noise of the children playing), a £1 donation is asked for in this instance.

Bell Ringers at the church

Community Flood Volunteer Training

Community flood volunteers and flood groups are key in helping their community to be prepared for flooding and other emergencies. They play a vital role in a community's response before, during, and after a flood.

Working in partnership the Environment Agency, Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue, Cambridgeshire County Council, Peterborough City Council and Anglian Water are offering free training sessions for all flood volunteers and those communities who are interested in setting up flood volunteers in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

You don't need any previous experience. You just need to be willing to learn how to help your community.

By attending the training, you'll gain an insight into the work of the Environment Agency and its partners.

Shed Security

Many people underestimate the value of the items they store in their sheds. Unfortunately criminals are fully aware of the value of the goods that some people do store in vulnerable places. The following advice can help to keep your property secure and reduce the chance of you becoming a victim of crime.

Whilst a shed is not designed to withstand any form of determined attack, there are some simple measures you can take to make them more secure. Position your garden shed as near to your house as possible so that it is clearly visible from your home.

Consider painting your house number and postcode onto your valuable gardening equipment (e.g. lawn mower, strimmer and tools). This makes them much less attractive to potential thieves as it makes them more difficult to sell on, and also increases the chances of the property being recovered and returned to its rightful owner if it is stolen.

Avoid storing valuable items such as power tools, fishing tackle or golf clubs in a shed. These items should be stored inside your home or a secure garage.

If you have been working in your garden ensure that you lock away tools such as spades or forks when you're finished. Tools left out overnight could be used by an intruder to gain access to your property.

If you don't intend to use the windows in your shed you can make them secure by screwing them shut or fitting window locks. Hanging old curtain or netting up against the window will prevent any prying eyes from seeing what is stored in your shed.

Locks and Bolts

The most effective way to secure shed doors is to fit a strong hasp and staple (also called a 'padbar'). Secure this with coach bolts (long bolts with a smooth head that cannot be undone with a screwdriver or spanner) and lock the hasp over the staple with a closed shackled padlock.

You can further protect your shed with items such as 'shed bars' and larger items such as cycles can be secured to shed shackles. These and other approved products can be found at www.soldsecure.com or www.securedbydesign.com.

Secure the shed door hinges with 'clutch head' or 'coffin' screws. These are a special type of screw that once fitted can only be unscrewed with a special tool. They can be purchased from DIY outlets and on the internet.

Blue recycling bin changes from 11th December.

South Cambridgeshire District Council is changing the way used paper is collected from residents for recycling.

From 11th December, residents won't need to use their caddies to recycle paper anymore.

From that date, residents should place their used paper directly into their blue wheelie bins instead. This used paper will still be recycled after being sorted from other materials at our facility near Waterbeach.

Residents can keep their caddy to use for anything they like. Alternatively, they can be recycled by being dropped off at the nearest household waste recycling centre. They should not be placed into wheelie bins.

The decision to withdraw the paper caddy service was taken at South Cambridgeshire District Council's Cabinet meeting in September. The decision will save taxpayers money and simplify the recycling process for residents.

Because of this upcoming change, the District Council will not be delivering any new paper caddies. If they are lost or stolen before 11th December, residents can begin putting paper in their blue bin.

After 11th December, residents can keep their caddies and use them however they wish. Alternatively, they can be taken to a household waste recycling centre for recycling. They should not be placed into wheelie bins.
