Events

Heritage Open Day: Extraordinary Women: What did you do in the Great War Great Grandma?

Saturday, 8th September, 10.00 - 16:30, St Peter's Church

The full programme for the events on 8th September is set out on the flier attached. The highlights of the day are:

- **10.30** Walk around the churchyard to look at your ancestors' gravestones and also the area where we may ask for permission to re-use for new burials. If you are interested, if you have family buried in Horningsea, if you would want to be buried here, this is a chance to come and see what the options may be.
- **13.00** Lady Sybil Grey, daughter of Earl Grey (of the tea fame) who was in Russia in 1916 during the Russian Revolution, caught up in the murder of Rasputin, then travelled to France where she set up a Women's Ambulance corps. An illustrated talk by her grandson Simon Boyd from her diaries and letters, and a chance to buy a signed copy of his book.
- **14.00** a talk by Mim Gardener, a descendant of the Pettitt family about the Pettitts of Horningsea at the beginning of the 20thcentury. Nettie Pettitt lived in St John's Lane, she was one of a large family. A number of her brothers also went to WWI and two were killed. We know she was aged about 14 in 1911, we know when she was baptised and there is a photograph of her at school, with reference to her in the school records, what did she do in the war and what happened to her afterwards? What did the rest of the Pettitt family do? How many Pettitts were there in Horningsea in 1918?

14.30 – Professor Rae Langton will talk about the suffrage movement and in particular some of the well known suffragettes or suffragists who had Cambridge connections, including Millicent Fawcett who studied at Newnham.

- **15.00** Ray Smith who has researched the Coprolite industry in Fen Ditton men and women worked alongside each other digging for coprolites his talk will be illustrated with photographs of the remnants of the coprolite workings that can still be seen in Fen Ditton.
- **15.30** a session called Letters from the Front this will depend on you producing letters or diaries written by your grandparents, great uncles, great grandparents About their experiences in the Great War. We already have some accounts of the work that women were suddenly expected to take on as their husbands joined up, a letter from the King to a bereaved father, accounts of life in the trenches... if you have a document you could read or if you have something you could lend for the exhibition (please photocopy anything precious) let one of the churchwardens know.
- 17.00 Short Evensong with a Thanksgiving for Women's Suffrage
- **18.15** the Ely and District Bell ringers will be coming to ring out the day.

There will be refreshments available all day – from a ploughman's lunch at 12.30 to tea and cakes off and on all afternoon in between the talks. Please come for all or part of the afternoon, call in for those parts which interest you, you never know you may stay for longer!

Optimist Course, Cam Sailing Club - Report Summer 2018 by Helen Harding-Male

The Cam Sailing Club is right on our doorstep and so a wonderful resource for those with a love of all things water. My childhood household was awash with shipping and boat images and so I aspired from an early age to be a sailor! It was only as an adult

that I realised my father disliked 'messing about in boats' and was a shipping solicitor not a frustrated sailor. Before moving to Horningsea I had bought a yacht - as you do and then when we started a family we sold the yacht - all without having really learnt to sail in between. When moving to Horningsea some seven years ago now we rather wistfully went down to the Sailing Club and also the Motor Boat Club next door and imagined a life on the river.



Our family dreams forgotten for some years I then heard from other families in the village that there were children's courses for 8 years plus. We didn't make the course the year our son Julian was 8 but I was determined that he would get on the course this summer, now aged 9, and so he could continue our now misplaced family fantasy

to be sailors and join the boating fraternity. We did agree that if he didn't take to it that we wouldn't force him as, after all, it was our fantasy not his.

The week runs Monday through Friday towards the end of July every year and the craft they learn on are called 'Optimists'. Small enough to navigate on their own and designed very much not to tip over! The week was super scorching hot so great weather but the wind of course was the key ingredient and that was a little mixed over the week itself, especially on the last day when a 'race' took place to mark the end of

the course and those taking part could test their newly learnt skills.

To our delight Julian loved every minute of the week and really did take to the water and the nature of the course. The course is run by those Club members who have been there for over two decades and have in fact been running the course for many years as



well. It is quite intense as the children are on the river for over 2 hours in the morning and then a further 2 hours in the afternoon. They really do go from complete novice to competent optimist sailor in the space of only a few days. For those who haven't been down to the Cam Sailing Club it is a rather idyllic hidden gem, as I said right on our doorstep; it feels like time has stopped and the developers aren't expanding across the City and indeed Waterbeach just for that moment! One parent told me across the week that if a child learns to sail on this particular part of the river then they can pretty much sail anywhere, another parent said that this was a highly regarded course and we were very lucky to have this opportunity on our doorstep.

One of the nicest things about the week was the huge community feel from all those involved in making the course a success, from the participants who ranged from 8 years upwards through to the 'teachers' who all had a variety of backgrounds and were not all local, one gentleman comes from Holland each year. A large number of support and key to making the course run well was received from teenagers and those who had been sailing for some years in Waterbeach and elsewhere. This amazing group of young people ensured that the younger ones who might feel shy or hesitant were actually being taught by their peer group or by those that perhaps they knew from their school or Horningsea itself. It was so much easier for them to take instruction from a kindly 17yr old than perhaps an older unknown adult. This group of teenagers and young adults were an absolutely amazing testament to their parents and upbringing as they really gave their time and energy and enthusiasm all week relentlessly without moaning about long days and getting up early or having to play football perhaps with young children after hours!

We chose to camp all week which added to the challenge in the high heat but actually meant that the children took part in the informal activities across the week, from a well organised film night through to a BBQ as well as a Fish 'n' Chips evening. By the end of the week Julian had learnt to sail, he felt part of a community right on the doorstep and we can only hope that if he perseveres that he too will be leading and inspiring future generations of sailors and romantic water lovers for years to come. I was so very pleased to have had the sailing club highlighted to us by fellow Horningsea residents and to be part of this very special and rather magical place for a week this Summer.

I might add that for those with similar sailing aspirations and no children or older children that they do run adult courses and the club welcomes all members from all backgrounds, it is run formally and informally and so there are rules but the members all advise and help each other out with advice on winter boat storage through to where to park.

Ditton Lane and Links to East Cambridge - cycleway works start Tuesday 28th August

For the construction of a new shared-use foot/cycleway, utility services such as cables and drains will need to be diverted. Work starts Tuesday 28th August; during the first two weeks the contractors will be setting up and carrying out investigation work. The work will begin on Horningsea Road at the High Ditch Road end and then proceed to the Primary School. The programme of work is due to run until Spring 2019. There will be temporary traffic lights 09:30 to 15:30 during the initial phase. There will be full closure of Ditton Lane and Horningsea Road in early 2019 (more details nearer the time). http://www.greatercambridge.org.uk/dittonlane it includes the following: Widening the current share foot/cycleway to 2.5m on both sides of Horningsea Road between High Ditch Road and just north of the primary school, at east side of Ditton Lane between Fison Road and High Ditch Road, between Ditton Lane crossing and Ditton Meadows and on the west side of the green area on Ditton Lane (south of the small car parking area next to no. 142 Ditton Lane); new toucan crossing north of the school and upgrade the puffin crossing near the High Street Fito a toucan crossing; pedestrian and cycling improvements to the area around Fison Road junction and Ditton Lane crossing.

Horningsea Adults & Toddlers - HATs

Horningsea adult and toddler group meets on a Tuesday morning in the village hall in Horningsea from 10-11:30.

We have Play-doh, a toy kitchen and food, toy farm animals, cars and garages, Duplo, puzzles, books and drawing materials as well as baby friendly toys along with support cushions for the really tiny ones. If the weather is nice the children have the opportunity to play outside with outdoor toys.

For adults there is a hot drink and biscuit and a chance for a chat whilst the little ones play.

A snack and drink is given to the children half way through the session which is included in the cost of the attendance. This cost is £2 per session, per family. However, if you pay for four sessions at once it's £6 (£1.50 per session).

Adults without children are also welcome if you fancy a hot drink and a chat (amongst the noise of the children playing), a £1 donation is asked for in this instance.
