Horningsea Parish Council Meeting 30th January - Report

It was good to see so many residents at the meeting to hear Tom Larnach, Cam Conservators' River Manager, talk about plans for the river and his wish to be more involved with Horningsea residents. He will attend the Annual Parish Meeting on 24th April to give residents another opportunity to talk to him.

This is the meeting at which the budget is set for the year in order for the council to request the Precept from SCDC. Village groups were invited to make funding applications which were discussed with costs for village maintenance, grass cutting, cemetery care etc. The council decided to keep the Precept at the same level as the current financial year so there will be no increase in council tax for the PC's costs. There is likely to be an increase for the County and District portions. District and County Councillors reports are available electronically.

The next PC meeting is on Wednesday 27 March at 19.30. All residents are very welcome at meetings. The agenda is posted on the notice board three days before the meeting.

I wanted to let you know that bus services across the county will be discussed at the Economy and Environment Committee meeting next week (7 February).

Whilst the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority's bus review continues and options are worked on, it's important existing bus services are protected.

From April, it is proposed all Cambridgeshire County Council funded bus services will continue after the county council and the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority agree funding for the next year.

The Combined Authority has asked Cambridgeshire County Council to continue providing bus service policy and delivery on its behalf for one more year while opportunities for radical reform of the network are explored.

Church Electoral Roll

Every so many years we have to completely update the church Electoral register, this is one of those years. If you are currently on the register you have to sign up again. If you are not yet on the register this is a good time to sign up. Being on the register allows you to vote at the annual meeting, would allow you to join the Parochial church council if you wanted to, might make you feel more committed to doing things or helping out but does not mean you are going to be burdened with new jobs or responsibilities! If you are a regular or even occasional church goer you are invited to come onto to the register. The forms to complete are in the church, ask the churchwardens or Liz Harrison for one, they must be filled in before the annual church meeting on 24th March.

Old Parish Magazines

Margaret Dorrington archived all the old Parish Magazines from October 1983 when Reverend Laurie Marsh started to take services. A quick glimpse at some of them reveals stories which will still be of interest today ...

In March 1984 George Wilson, John Wilsons father, wrote about the War Memorial he had organised naming three men who died in WWII.

In July 1985 there was a letter from Michael Gingell who said "I am at present in a rather shattered state lying on a bed in Paris. It took me three hours forty two minutes - but I did it!" He had run the Paris marathon having trained for twelve weeks and covered 376 miles mainly on Waterbeach airfield. There were 13,000 competitors taking part. The marathon started at the Arc de Triumph in a thunderstorm. He raised £1800 for cancer charities.

In August 1985 there was an account by George Wilson on "Edie's Memorial Day" when 50 people came and enjoyed raffles, cake, book stalls and bring and buy. Molly Marshall took a hen and day old chicks as well as three goslings (it is not clear if they were to sell or for show)!

In February 1987 Reverend Lawrie Marsh described the plan to raise £14,000 to install electric light, heating and running water in the church.

In February 1988 thanks were given to Freda Daws for restoring the St Peters Banner.

Every year thanks were given to Margaret Dorrington and Molly Marshall for picking and selling hundreds of bunches of snowdrops for the church.

Throughout 1988 there were excerpts from the Parish Magazines from 1889. Maybe we can include some extracts in a future Horningsea Herald.

Traffic speeds in Horningsea

The Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) has been up in the village since March 2018. The Parish Council has conducted some analysis on data collected between 20/5/18 and 10/11/18 and can report the following findings:

- Data and anecdotal evidence shows that the VAS slows vehicles down and improves adherence to the 30 mph speed limit, particularly during the daytime (07:00 – 19:00)
- Vehicles travelling late at night or in the early hours are less likely to drive within the speed limit
- Around 80% of vehicles travel at 30mph or less when the VAS is present
- This reduces to 60% when it is outside Kings Cottages (north entrance to the village)
- However, this means that 20-40% of vehicles are still speeding even with the VAS and even more when the VAS is not present.
- Maximum speeds recorded between 20/5/18 and 10/11/18 were 75 mph, at both the north and south ends of the village (01:15 and 05:30)
- Weekday average traffic volumes are 2,500 at the north end and 3,500 at the south end (presumably greater due to visitors to Scotsdales and the pubs being more likely to enter and leave via the south end).
- Peak traffic volumes are 08:00-09:00 at the north end of the village and 17:00-18:00 at the south end
- Approximately 300 vehicles on an average week day during these times

The Parish Council will continue to monitor the VAS data and consider ways that could further reduce speeding through Horningsea.

Horningsea Adults & Toddlers - HATs

Horningsea adult and toddler group meets on Tuesday morning in the village hall in Horningsea from 10-11:30.

We have Play-doh, a toy kitchen and food, toy farm animals, cars and garages, Duplo, puzzles, books and drawing materials as well as baby friendly toys along with support cushions for the really tiny ones. If the weather is nice the children have the opportunity to play outside with outdoor toys.

For adults there is a hot drink and biscuit and a chance for a chat whilst the little ones play.

A snack and drink is given to the children half way through the session which is included in the cost of the attendance. This cost is £2 per session, per family. However, if you pay for four sessions at once it's £6 (£1.50 per session).

Adults without children are also welcome if you fancy a hot drink and a chat (amongst the noise of the children playing), a £1 donation is asked for in this instance.

We look forward to welcoming you to the group!

There is plenty of parking available outside the village hall.

Bell Ringers at the church
