# Dealing with Floating Pennywort – Horningsea's alien, invasive water plant

### Mike Foley, Cam Valley Forum

This water plant which grows across rivers, ditches and canals as thick, floating mats of spaghetti-like stems and leaves is not only a problem of the Horningsea stretch of the Cam. Brought into Europe from the Americas and sold as a plant for aquaria, it escaped into the wild around 1990 and now affects thousands of sites throughout the country. From 2006 it gained foot-holds along several miles of the Cam from Grantchester to well beyond its confluence with the Ouse, and in some stretches it is now rampant



each summer growing rapidly in summer (up to 20cm/day) from tiny fragments of stem which drift down the river during winter breakup of mats. From small beginnings rafts can become huge and dominate the water flora and reduce biodiversity.

In just two years, volunteers from Cam Valley Forum <u>https://camvalleyforum.uk/</u> with support from other groups and organisations has confronted and effectively dealt with a serious problem upriver from Cambridge. Cam Valley Forum is now looking further afield to help in other parts of the Cam. Downriver to Bottisham Lock the Cam Conservators are required to maintain navigability and have to pull out mats repeatedly each year before they become a hazard. This level management can never hope to

eradicate it. So in 2019 Cam Valley Forum and CamCon joined forces, with the intention to blitz the Pennywort between Cambridge and Clayhithe. The uppermost major reservoir of Pennywort (which has existed since 2011) was identified as the Fen Ditton drainage ditch and this was cleared out mainly by raking (with six return visits so far to deal with missed plants).

Two further working parties in June and October involved conservation-minded volunteers from the Cambridge Canoe Club and teams of bank rakers. A new weed boat, the 'Conver' joined CamCon's flotilla this year and is proving very helpful in raking out vegetation from the river edges (photo, and it can be viewed <u>here</u> in action). Working alone, it cannot remove all the strands and small mats and this is where volunteers excel, especially working from Canadian canoes (with thanks to Chris Lindley for loaning us two and to John Harrison for launching the canoes).



We need more volunteers for working parties in 2020, especially proficient canoeists, and anyone who wants to help is warmly invited to contact us through Mike Foley mfpfoley@gmail.com. No more teamwork is envisaged until April / May. Already we are finding that Horningsea's stretch of the river is problematic because

Pennywort can hide well in the dense vegetation and is very difficult to extricate from reed beds. We will need to revisit stretches several times to ensure we don't leave any behind that will bite back later on, but we are doing our best and the effort put in should be very worthwhile.

# Greater Cambridge Local Plan – The First Conversation -Consultation

### **Greater Cambridge Shared Planning**

It's a very exciting time for Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire District Councils, as we are preparing a new joint Local Plan together that will affect the future of Greater Cambridge over the next 20 years. This consultation will be called Greater Cambridge Local Plan – The First Conversation and will start the discussion about the kind of place we want Greater Cambridge to be in the future. It will explore the 'big themes' – climate change, biodiversity, social inclusion and great places – that will influence how homes, jobs and infrastructure are planned, and where growth might go. Our consultation will run until 17:00 on Monday 24th February 2020.

The Councils would like to encourage a wide range of people and groups to have their say in what Greater Cambridge should be like and would like as many people as possible to give their views and get involved with the Local Plan process.

We will also be holding a 'Big Debate' on the evening of 18th February, where we are inviting local groups to share their ideas about what should be in the Local Plan, in a fun, provocative and lively public event.

### Horningsea Adults & Toddlers - HATs

Horningsea adult and toddler group meets on Tuesday morning in the village hall in Horningsea from 10-11:30.

We have Play-doh, a toy kitchen and food, toy farm animals, cars and garages, Duplo, puzzles, books and drawing materials as well as baby friendly toys along with support cushions for the really tiny ones. If the weather is nice the children have the opportunity to play outside with outdoor toys.

For adults there is a hot drink and a biscuit and a chance for a chat whilst the little ones play.

A snack and drink is given to the children half way through the session which is included in the cost of attendance. This cost is  $\pounds 2$  per session, per family. However, if you pay for four sessions at once it's  $\pounds 6$  ( $\pounds 1.50$  per session).

Adults without children are also welcome if you fancy a hot drink and a chat (amongst the noise of the children playing), a £1 donation is asked for in this instance.
