The sky above Horningsea in December

Monday 21st December, above your heads.

There are many celestial events happening above our village that go unnoticed by most people. Later this month there will be such an event that has not occurred since Tudor times. There will be a great conjunction between Jupiter and Saturn on the 21st of December.

Great conjunctions are rare and the last one of this magnitude was in the 1600. Some astronomers think that a Great Confunction is what led to the sighting of the star of Bethlehem as they have been backward traced to that time (there was a Great Conjunction at 6 BC).

Conjunctions occur when heavenly bodies, either stars or planets, align themselves in orbit and appear brighter.

A Great Conjunction is when Saturn and Jupiter become aligned. Due to their long orbits this does not happen very often. Jupiter takes around 11.9 years and Saturn takes 29.5 years to orbit the sun.

This great conjunction, weather permitting, can be observed low in the south west, i.e. towards Milton sewage works just above the horizon ,and can be viewed either by the

naked eye, binoculars or telescope. A good viewing point would be the bottom of Laney meadow.

Remember that if you are using a telescope or binoculars do not be tempted to view any part of the sunset, no matter how weak. Your eyes do not have any pain receptors and significant damage to your eyesight can occur without you noticing it.

If you miss this one then there is another one due in the year 7514.

Letter from Lockdown

Where Death and Danger Go

In May 2018 our recorder group were playing in St Peter's when a lady came in and had a good look round the church. She stopped by us to listen and, at a suitable juncture, introduced herself as Vicky Knox, an author from Sydney, who was exploring the local area.

At the time she had written two books set in Britain in the early second world war years and then a couple of months ago she emailed to say that she had completed a third book "Where Death and Danger Go", the title coming from Churchill who, in a speech to the House of Commons in 1916, said "Honours should go where death and danger go".

This book is set in 1941 too and the action takes place both in Cambridge and in the local fens, including Horningsea. St Peter's, the Crown and Punchbowl and the Bridge get a mention and are the site of some action, as are Lode and areas further afield.

I enjoyed reading the book. It's quite fast moving and has an intriguing plot which ties together historical events of the time. The reading was made all the more enjoyable by my knowing the places and buildings where the action takes place. There were certainly some interesting characters involved and it's a pity Rev. Wisdom passed St Peter's quite late in the evening. If he'd been a bit earlier he might have heard recorders playing! Obviously though, as a book written about wartime, it gets rather gritty at times.

I wrote to ask her what made her choose this area and she replied "I begin a story based largely around a small, almost insignificant historical fact. That fact in this book was the German Spy Josef Jakobs landing in a field in Wistow near Ramsey. Then I research that fact in great detail, often finding other tiny facts that will form the basis of the plot, hence this story was set in Cambridge and surrounds."

This is the third book in the Reverend Clement Wisdom series. There is reference to some elements in the second book in the series, which I haven't read but which didn't matter. For reference the first of the books in the series is entitled "In Spite of All

Terror" and set in East Sussex in 1940 and the second is "If Necessary, Alone" and set in Caithness in 1941. Both are murder mysteries / crime thrillers.

If interested this book by V.M. Knox is published by Book Reality and is available in paperback or as an ebook.

FCC Communities Foundation is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community projects through the Landfill Communities Fund and we are delighted that they have approved our funding application!





Lucy Frazer end of year update

As we look to the end of 2020, I wanted to take this opportunity to update you on some of the work I have been doing over the course of this year.

2020 has been a challenging year for all of us and I want to pay tribute to everyone who has helped and supported their local communities and vulnerable individuals during the pandemic. The response to the public health challenge of Coronavirus saw us pulling together, ensuring that our communities across Cambridgeshire kept connected. And I know that our villages are continuing their great support to others. I was pleased to safely meet with local volunteers in person across the constituency during the summer months – and to take part in regular Zoom updates with local leaders and stakeholders.

The Coronavirus pandemic brought an economic shock to the UK like we have not experienced before, but I am encouraged to see that we are taking steps towards a positive recovery. By the summer, in our area 14,700 furloughed workers were supported through the Job Retention Scheme and 4,600 self-employed individuals were given help through the Self-Employment Income Scheme. 1,687 local businesses received a cash grant of up to £25,000 thanks to the local authority discretionary grant fund. Whilst these measures have brought relief to both employers and employees, local shopping has also brought with it further support over the last few months.

Whilst the government is focused on dealing with the pandemic, other projects are still progressing and I continue to work to improve our area. I welcome the announcement that the Department of Health has awarded Cambridge University hospitals £1.9 million to expedite the complete redevelopment of Addenbrooke's hospital, this will include a new children's hospital. And at the beginning of October, the Prime Minister also announced the building of a new cancer hospital. Residents across Cambridgeshire rely upon Addenbrooke's Hospital for their medical care, and population growth makes its complete replacement with a brand new hospital in the years ahead a necessity.

I have campaigned hard for continued investment in NHS services in our local area, and the construction of a new hospital has my complete support. This development is further evidence of the government's commitment to this scheme, and the NHS more generally. I will continue to do everything in my power to make sure that Cambridgeshire sustains its reputation for world-class medical services.

Furthermore for some I have been pressing for improvements to the A10 and spearheaded the campaign for its dualling. Some progress has been made on this project. There are eight options for the project, and the Mayor and Combined Authority held a virtual consultation during the summer to collect feedback from residents and road users. I have continued to press the Treasury on the importance of this work.

The Greenways scheme is one of the local efforts to improve cycleways by constructing routes between central Cambridge and nearby villages. The routes will help to reduce

pressure on public transport and offer more environmentally friendly ways to commute and get around. I have supported this scheme since 2017, working with the Greater Cambridge Partnership and other local stakeholders to ensure that local residents were involved in determining the routes. This currently includes 6 routes in our area. I am really pleased that the routes to Fulbourn, Waterbeach and Linton have been approved. Having recently met with the GCP and written to the Board to press for further routes I am delighted that the three further routes in Horningsea, Bottisham and Swaffhams have also been approved. I'm looking forward to using the routes and hope you will do the same!

Education has also been a key campaign pledge since I was first elected. Year after year I have taken heads to Westminster to meet the Education Secretary. As a result of much campaigning with teachers and others the 2021-2022 academic year will see per pupil funding increase by an average of 4%. The National Funding Formula allocations reflect a 60% increase in the total additional funding for small and remote schools- and this is good news for small schools in our area who can attract further funding due to their status. I remain proud that East Cambridgeshire is one of 12 Opportunity Areas that enables the region to unlock additional funding.

I continue to hold regular surgeries and am here to help with any issues you may have. Constituents who would like help with a problem or want to arrange a telephone call or a virtual meeting should contact me by emailing lucy.frazer.mp@parliament.uk.
