Easter at St Peters Church

The preparations for Easter begin with a **Palm Sunday service at 10.30** in Fen Ditton on Sunday 2 April. On Monday 3 April there will be a **Service of Compline** at 19.30 at St Peters Church. Compline is a traditional late evening, contemplative service and is always very special. There will be services of Compline in Teversham on 4th and Fen Ditton on 5 April.

On **Tuesday 4 April the Pilgrim Cross** will be walking through the village on their way from London to Walsingham in Norfolk. They expect to arrive in Horningsea at just after 10am. You can't miss them - about 18 people carrying a large cross coming through the fields from Baits Bite and along the High Street to the church. Do join in and walk with them, even if it is just through the village. Refreshments will be on offer in the church as the pilgrims dry out, check for blisters, sing and then head off again across the fields to Lode. Do come and meet them.

On **Good Friday** 7 April there will be a quiet service at 12 noon.

On **Easter Day Sunday** 9 April the special Easter Service will be at 10.30. This will be a service suitable for all the family (there may even be an egg or two ...)

- 3rd April, 19:30 Service of Compline (St Peters Church) Also Services of Compline at Teversham (4th) and Fen Ditton (5th).

- 9th April, 10:30, Easter Sunday (St Peters Church)

Weekend of 6/8 May

Coronation weekend celebrations : more details!

Here are some more details about specific events over the weekend

Coronation Day Saturday 6th May - the church will be open all day with live streaming of the events in London on a large screen. The screening will start first thing

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(come and have breakfast!) and continue all day until the Royal party gather on the balcony at Buckingham Palace. Refreshments will be on sale all day. You can come for the whole day or just pop in for a short while.

The church will also host an exhibition of books about the Royal family that Vee has collected over 80 years - from Queen Victoria to Prince Harry's new book "Spare"! Photographs and memorabilia from earlier Royal celebrations will be on display too.

Horningsea Coronation mugs will be available to distribute to Horningsea children and to sell.

Sunday 7th May at 10.30 - there will be a special Coronation Service, before the HRA take over organising the events on the Village Green in the afternoon and evening. The Horningsea Coronation mugs will be available on the Village Green too.

Bank holiday Monday 8th May - At 14:00 the Friends of Horningsea church invite you to volunteer to work on a wildlife project in the churchyard. It is hoped that we can do enough conservation work to apply for a Bronze medal. Tasks will include making signs showing where our bug hotel is based, making a hover fly lagoon, checking our churchyard is hedgehog friendly with drinking areas, noting the spring flowers and early summer flowers growing at the margins.... And looking for bugs, butterflies, bees, birds, bats and anything else beginning with "b"!

HVHT and HMGT annual chairman's report for 2023

Michael Hellowell, chairman Horningsea village hall trust (HVHT) & Horningsea Millenium Green Trust (HMGT)

Recent Past - As expected, both trusts have had a rather quieter year or so, because of our need to pick-up after Covid-19 Pandemic, although access to the hall has been unrestricted since earlier with 'changing' government rules. Even outside events on the green have not been happening as often as we'd have liked. Charity Commission Trustee Records & Annual Returns are up to date and we've again acquired NNDR Zero Business Rate exemption. Other grants from SCDC, have not been awarded to us during 2022/23, but Insurances and Licence renewals, ACRE membership have all been paid/renewed. Amending bookings/cancellations/ returning deposits, agreeing access/licences for geo surveys for the proposed Anglian Water relocation of new sewage works etc have also taken up a fair proportion of time during last 12 months.

Trustees - We lost 1 trustee before our last AGM with Jayne Neale finding her work pressures too hectic to give sufficient time to the Trusts. Thanks and appreciation was extended to her, we now have 8 trustees remaining having warmly welcomed Marilyn Dew as representative of our Horticultural Society, but we look to recruit a Toddler Group representative and A N Other?

Recent Achievements - Thanks to John/Sue for re-cording the flagpole and refurbishing the flags, Paul Kemp repaired post and rail fences, Alan Leader has just re-decorated the interior of the hall and we now have Cambridge Fibre's improved WiFi installed. For the green, we must again congratulate our groundsmen for superb grass cutting, Marilyn and Gary for the Daffodil bulb planting, Richard for tending the bank beside the pond, John H for the superb clean-up of the southern ditch, plus fitting the 'Sheffield' cycle stands and Richard for his very recent re-seeding of the bank of spoil. Our appreciation also goes to Scotsdales for the kind donation of the Java Teak garden bench to commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III.

Finance - Thanks again to the income from earlier Covid Grants and more recently ACRE/SCDC grant for our 15 recently run 'Warm Hub' meetings by Sue and Michael, our wealth remains good for the hall, whereas finances for the green remain less wealthy over the last twelve months with no income from marquees, plus a need for pond/ditch maintenance. More information/figures later from both our treasurers. Hall/Green letting fees were increased at the start of 2023 and will be reviewed more regularly so as to keep abreast of 'rocketing electricity rates' and new WiFi charges, until our bookings have again resumed and business and utility rates becomes more 'back to normal'. Alternative HVHT/HMGT bankers to Barclays are being considered.

Future Plans - Our applications to SCDC's Zero Carbon Community Grant (with replacement heaters in mind) were sadly unsuccessful. A further round of SCDC applications have been invited and we ought to submit another application during 2022/23. Our renewing Hallmark status has again been promoted by Cambs ACRE, for our decision. A quotation for paving the apron in front of hall main entrance was obtained, but this was considered fairly expensive, so other plans / quotes are still needed for more consideration. We fit out a new wall cupboard for sound equipment and generally tidied up our storage facilities. Replacement roller blinds were purchased and some have already been fitted in the hall. A new cupboard in cloakroom is to be fitted to house our re-sited electricity meter.

Summary - We remain delighted to continue our close working relationships with HPC, HRA, Parish Church, Horticultural group, Toddlers, Musicians, Artists and all regular hall hirers. We are also more recently giving all support possible our SHH Action group.

As chairman, I wish to thank my fellow officers and all fellow trustees for their invaluable input. Although being slightly biased, from the Chair I recognise and thank Pauline on behalf of us all for her tireless work with bookings, cancellations, collection, banking of fees and return of deposits. Furthermore, Garrick was welcomed and deserves thanking for grasping the task of keeping the hall clean and tidy over the past 12 months, to now handover to a new volunteer Alan for the future.

Crossing the Line

There is one day that will always be fixed in a deep sea sailor's memory and that is the first time you cross the equator. bProbably a tradition that has now been diluted with modern health and safety, but nevertheless an important occasion in the life of a sailor

The tradition is basically an initiation ceremony on young, old, men and women who dare to venture into Neptune's kingdom which is marked by the equator.

On cargo ships it could be quite ruthless. At the given hour of convenience as the ship passed over the equator Neptune would board the ship with his entourage and set up on the deck his courtroom. All crew would be mustered with no exception and asked to reveal to his henchmen those who had entered his kingdom illegally.

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Of course it was all well organised theatre and those who were accused or denounced by the Captain and Crew would be set upon by his policemen, dragged in front of Neptune and sentenced. First they were shaved then dunked in grease and oil before being thrown into a makeshift swimming pool or tub. After the ceremony Neptune usually put on a party and the day is rounded off with homemade entertainment, including lashings of beer and food, and the presentation of

a much treasured certificate giving you free passage across the line on future voyages. There were two of us on my first trip to sea and I can remember it took a long time to clean up afterwards.

On passenger ships this was looked on as one of the activities for entertaining passengers and was a much gentler affair, more of a carnival day, you may have seen them on some of the cruise programs or programs on the Royal navy. At the end of the day no one is spared whatever rank. The two passenger ships I was on, the City of York and City of Durban were no exemption. Only this time, as apprentices we were the police charged in rounding



up the wrong doers, before delivering them to the court of Neptune.



Perhaps on modern day cargo ships this tradition no longer carries on. The crews are small, and apart from taking over from your watch mate, you hardly ever see anyone else. The most exciting thing on the voyage is to look forward to a change of container outside your port hole blocking any view. Will it be a green one or a red one or perhaps a refrigerated container which bursts into life as you just close your eyes? I doubt if you would even see Neptune and his entourages arrive.

Horningsea Short Story Competition 2023

You are invited to enter the third Horningsea Short Story Competition. There are separate classes for young people and adults. This competition is open to all writers, but please check the rules. Entrants are welcome to submit more than one story (tell your friends!), but a fee is payable for each entry.

- Theme for adult and teenager entries : Close
- Theme for children's entries: A Close Thing

Adults' competition: 1st prize £50, 2nd prize £25

Over 16s should submit a short story of a maximum length of 2000 words.

Competition for writers aged under 12 on May 31st 2023. 1st prize £15 book token

Young people aged 12 years and under should submit a story of a maximum length of 500 words.

Competition for writers aged 12-16 years on May 31st 2023. 1st prize £20 book token

Young people aged 12-16 years should submit a story of a maximum length of 1000 words.

Entry fee: £1 for young people; £5 for adults per entry.

Deadline: May 31st 2023 for all age groups.

Horningsea Herald Application form is attached to the covering email.

Rules and conditions.

All entries must be the original work of the entrant. Stories must not have won a competition before and must not have been published.

All stories must be within the word limit for the age group.

All stories must have been delivered by email or by hand before the deadline of midnight on May 31st 2023.

All stories must be written in English. The theme can be interpreted in any way. Each story must have a title that is different from the theme.

Stories will be judged anonymously by an independent panel. Entrants must not put their name or any other identifying details on their story. Instead, they should include a separate electronic file or sheet of paper to accompany their story on which they put their name, address and a contact telephone number/email address _as well as the title of their story_. Pages should be numbered and each page should include the title of the story as a header.

Emailed entries should be sent to: <u>fran@fransmithwriting.co.uk</u>. If you wish to pay the entry fee electronically, you should ask for details when you send your entry.

Entries being delivered by hand can be left at St John's Barn, St John's Lane, Horningsea and should include the entry fee in cash.

The judges' decisions will be final. Brief comments will be given on the winning children's entries only.

Winners in each category will be announced at a book event in St Peter's Church, Horningsea on Saturday, June 17th. The full details of the event will be announced later, but it will include book sales and talks by local authors. Winners will be invited to attend and read part of their story aloud.

If writers wish to be included, a paperback anthology of stories will be published. Previous anthologies of winning stories are available on Amazon.

This event is usually supported by Horningsea Residents' Association. If any profit is made, it will be donated to St Peter's Church, Horningsea to cover the costs of hosting the prize giving celebration.

Horningsea Coronation Mugs

your child/children's details on a slip of paper, put in an envelope and pop into a box that will be in the church porch from this weekend until 1 May 2023. The slips will be destroyed once the mugs have been distributed on the Coronation weekend 6/7/8 May.

There will be some extra mugs available to purchase over the weekend. They will cost about £5 each.

Do NOT send articles as PDF or Word files. Stay under 700 words, preferably less. Attach any photos to the email.
