Environment Sunday: Events in Horningsea Church and Churchyard: Friends of Horningsea Church

Sunday 2nd June

15.00 to 17.00 - come and explore the wildlife in Horningsea Churchyard- find out how many moths were trapped in the churchyard overnight, and help identify them. Check whether bugs and beetles have been using our Bug Hotel. Can you find any sign of the hedgehogs who live in the churchyard - or foxes or small mammals who regard the churchyard as a home. Look into the hedges to see how many varieties of fruiting plants we have - can you see any bird nests?

Horningsea churchyard is alive with wildlife, help us to make a record of what can be found in 2024. Help us apply for an Eco Church award.

Six inches of soil - the acclaimed film will be shown in Horningsea Church on Sunday 2 June at 18.00. The film explores the inspiring story of British farmers standing up to the industrial food system and transforming the way they produce food - to heal the soil, benefit our health and provide for local communities. We owe our whole existence to six inches of topsoil -and rain! Regenerative farming - farming as our ancestors did - is becoming the new way to farm. Colin Ramsay, the Director of the film who lives in Horningsea, will give an introduction to the film and will be able to answer questions at the end.

The film was shown to great acclaim at the COP 28 conference in December 2023 and has sold out at showings all over the country. Tickets will need to be purchased in advance at \$10 a ticket

Save Honey Hill update: End of Examination letter

The Planning Inspectorate's Examination Period has now ended and all final submissions are in. Or are they? These last few weeks have not been without some twists and turns and last-minute submissions from the applicant, Anglian Water, and the Save Honey Hill team has worked flat out to read, check and counter, if necessary, documents put out at the eleventh hour whilst simultaneously preparing its own rounding up Closing submission

The Save Honey Hill team has truly performed an Herculean task since the Examination began back in October 2023. Supported by your donations, which enabled the input and advice of legal counsel, the team has represented our communities at numerous hearings and meetings and produced dozens of high quality, thoroughly researched documents setting out why we believe this sewage plant relocation project is unnecessary, unjustified, flawed and just plain wrong.

Our Closing Submission included the following paragraph:

"Save Honey Hill's primary objective is to protect the Green Belt and in so doing the historic setting of the City of Cambridge. SHH continues to strongly object to relocation of the WWTP to Honey Hill, which has been demonstrated to be unnecessary. At the heart of this project is not the need for the infrastructure, but instead reliance is placed on the benefit of housing delivery. That is not the primary function of the national infrastructure regime. The Applicant has always stated that the relocation is predicated on the need to release brownfield land in North East Cambridge to enable housing development, and the Housing Infrastructure Fund was applied for and granted on this assumption. SHH has challenged the premise. It has objected to the application and the Applicant's arguments and shown that there is no justification. Importantly, 'very special circumstances' have not been established for the relocation."

So now is an opportunity for a little bit of downtime for the team as we see the DCO application move into its next phase. The Planning Inspectors must prepare their recommendation for the Secretary of State and in line with normal protocol, this must be done within three months of the end of the examination period. Once the report goes to the Secretary of State, he or she then has a further three months to make the decision to grant or refuse development consent. For our campaign, the curve ball comes in the form of a general election which, of course, could mean a change of government not least a change of Secretary of State. This could very well delay the announcement of the decision further, pushing it even so far as into 2025 -- we will just have to wait and see!

Finally, thank you, all of you, for your donations, support and words of encouragement -- we couldn't have got this far without you!

We would also like to tell you that we feel now is an appropriate time to remove our posters and banners from round and about -- we wanted to warn you that they are coming down but that doesn't in any way mean the Save Honey Hill campaign is over.

The Friends of Horningsea Church visit to Jesus College Gardens - Report

It was a beautiful spring day in April when the Friends were taken on a tour of Jesus College gardens by the head gardener Lee - a most impressive, enthusiastic and knowledgeable young man. He explained that the College sits in 33 acres so his responsibility includes the sports fields, wildlife path, planting in the courtyards, the Fellows garden and Master's garden. He is also responsible for gardens at College houses in Lower Park Street, New Square and Jesus Lane.

Most of the courts have three sides with the open side allowing extensive or intriguing views of Jesus Green, the cricket pitch, the river or archways leading to more courts and more planting.

The wisteria was coming in to full bloom - did you know that Chinese wisteria and Japanese wisteria twirl in opposite directions - one clockwise and the other anti-clockwise!



The College has taken positive steps to lead to 0% carbon by 2030 by installing ground source heat pumps under the cricket pitch. They use no weed killers so weed by hand and mulch as much as they can following the "no dig" philosophy. They have planted a number of wildflower lawns using the seeds from established lawns - in the summer they scythe by hand to scatter and save the seed. For every tree they lose through disease or storm damage they plant three more. The edge of the cricket pitch has a bee bank and wildflower area.

It was a wonderful lesson to us all as to how an imaginative and creative approach to gardening can create such eco friendly and attractive spaces. We are all determined to visit again later in the year to see the wildflower meadows in their full glory!

Parking outside Fen Ditton Primary school

Fen Ditton Primary School Governors

It is now getting very dangerous to park outside Fen Ditton Primary school - traffic is increasing and the road works keep starting and stopping. There have been a number of near misses as cars try to do three-point turns before or after dropping children. Teachers now have to stand outside and manoeuvre bollards to make sure there is space for "blue badge holders" - putting themselves at risk of being injured. A request has been made to Highways Dept (Cambridgeshire County Council) for the lay-by to be designated "Blue Badge holders only" but so far the request has not received a positive response. The school therefore asks all parents/carers to park in one of the side roads and walk the last few hundred metres, leaving the lay-by for blue badge holders.
